God's Everlasting Remembrance

Time is seldom kind to our memory. As the twenty-year anniversary of my high school graduation rapidly approaches I am reminded of how dull one's memory can become over the years. Thankfully, God is not like us. John writes, "For God is greater than our hearts, and He knows everything" (1 John 3:20).

The Bible proclaims the truth of God's omniscience (all-knowingness) which teaches that God knows all facts about Himself and His creation. His exhaustive knowledge extends to even the smallest details of life, such as what color socks you wore on this date in 1983 and what you ate for breakfast on June 3rd of 1997.

But it is not just that God remembers and knows all past events, it is also that He knows all things actual and possible past, present, and future. This is where our minds really get stretched. As theologian Wayne Grudem comments, God "fully knows all things that He could have done but did not do and all things that He might have created but did not create. He also knows all possible events that will not actually happen, and events that would have resulted if some other events had turned out differently in history." While God is doing all of that, you cannot even remember where you put the car keys!

Yet more amazing still, all these facts and all other things that God knows are always fully present in His consciousness at all times. If I were to ask you a question you would have to recall the information and retrieve it from the recesses of your consciousness. You may be able to remember it (or not!), but you would have to pause to think about the answer. God is not that way. Every fact, both actual and possible, past, present, and future, is in the forefront of God's mind continually. He never has to retrieve information, because all of the facts of the universe are front and center in His thinking at all times. Here is an appropriate place to sit back and say, "Wow!"

Knowing all of these things about God's omniscience may cause us to ponder what David has in mind in Psalm 25 when he writes about God's memory. In verse 7 he writes, "Do not remember the sins of my youth, nor my transgressions." But since God is

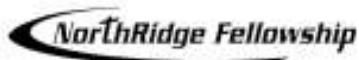
omniscient how could He not remember something, especially sin?

In the Old Testament God says, "I, even I, am He who blots out your transgressions for My own sake; and I will not remember your sins" (Isaiah 43:25). God also says, "For I will forgive their iniquity, and their sin I will remember no more" (Jeremiah 31:34). When we read these passages it seems that God has actually forgotten something and it would seem that our sins have slipped from his mind and memory. But that is not exactly the case. God does not forget our sin. Rather, He chooses and promises not to remember our sin any longer.

This is not just semantics; there is a big difference. God cannot forget anything because He is omniscient so it is impossible for Him to forget. When you forget something it is an act that passively happens in your mind as the event passes from your memory. But while forgetting is passive, forgiving is quite active. It is God choosing not to bring our sins back to His memory. God does not forget our sins in the sense that they have passed from His memory and His mind, but rather He chooses not to mention them or recount them or think about them or bring them up to me again. My sins which were paid for by Jesus Christ's sacrifice on my behalf will never be brought to mind by God again. He lovingly and actively chooses to remember them no more.

While God chooses to forget my sins, He always remembers His love and His people. David in Psalm 25 asks that his sins would be forgotten, but he also asks God to, "Remember, O Lord, Your tender mercies and Your lovingkindnesses, for they are from old...According to Your mercy remember me" (Psalm 25:6-7). Right at this moment God's mercy and love are at the forefront of His mind. He is at this instant thinking about how enduring His mercy is and about how lavish and unceasing His love is. Not only that, but right now I am on God's mind. And He is thinking about how my sins have been forgiven and how He now sees me as His beloved child through faith in Jesus Christ. Time will not dim God's memory of me, His child saved by grace, and Jesus His Son whose sacrifice made it all possible.

The Bible speaks, not of a thankful attitude as a good idea, but as a command: "And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body. And be thankful." (Colossians 3:15)

We have so much for which to be thankful, yet we often find ourselves anything but thankful. How many times a day do we hear others, and sometimes ourselves, caught up in complaining. It seems that once complaining starts it snowballs so that we have a negative view of everything. It becomes a habit, a way of life.

The key to being thankful is found in the first part of the verse. We must let the peace of Christ rule in our hearts. For something to rule, it has to dominate. An Excerpt From The Classics



From "Christ Is All in All," by Jeremiah Burroughs (1600-1645)

The Apostle Paul was a chosen vessel to bear the name of Christ, to carry it up and down in the world. Indeed, his spirit was full of Christ. He desired to know nothing but Christ, to preach nothing but Christ, to be found in none but Christ. The very name of Christ was delightful to him. He seeks to magnify Christ in all of his epistles and, in these words I read to you, he omnifies Christ. He does not only make Him great but he makes Him all. "There is neither Greek nor Jew, circumcision nor uncircumcision, barbarian, Scythian, bond nor free, but Christ is all and in all." [Colossians 3:11] That is, there is no privilege in the one to commend them to God, and there is no lack of anything in the other to hinder them from God. Let men be what they will in their outward respects, what is that to God? Let them be never so mean in regard of all outward things, that can never hinder them from the enjoyment of God, for God does not look at these things, but Christ is all and in all to them.

But that which is the main scope of the Holy Ghost here is this high expression of Christ's transcendent excellency, which I will deliver in this doctrinal proposition: Christ is the only means of conveyance of good that God the Father intends to communicate unto the children of men in order to eternal life; He is all in all. This which I am to preach to you now, namely God's communicating Himself in His mercy to mankind through a Mediator, is the very sum of the gospel, the great mystery of godliness. It is the chief part of the mind and counsel of God that He would have made known to the children of men in this world. This is the great message that the ministers of the gospel have to bring, and it is the most absolutely necessary point in all theology.

...As He is all in all in the good we have from God, so He is all in all in whatever we offer up to God: as in descent from God to us, so in ascent from us to God. Christ must come in here. He must be all in all in our services. Though our services be never so good, though they are spiritual, they must still find acceptance with the Father through Christ. That text in I Peter 2:5 is very remarkable for this, "Ye also, as lively stones, are built up a spiritual house, an holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God by Jesus Christ." Mark, to offer up spiritual sacrifices. But though the sacrifice is spiritual, that is not enough to make it acceptable. Christ must come in. Therefore he adds, acceptable to God *by Jesus Christ*.

If Christ is all in all, then let us bless God that ever we knew Christ, and that the great mystery of the gospel has been revealed to us. For otherwise we would have been without God in the world, and what would have become of us had not this grace of God in the gospel been revealed to us? Could it ever have entered into your heart? Certainly not, nor into the heart of any creature in heaven and earth. Therefore, blessed are your ears that hear the things you hear. Blessed are your eyes which see the things you see, and know that when you come to live under the ministry of the gospel, you enjoy the greatest mercy that you have enjoyed since you were born.

This shows how dear Jesus Christ should be to us. Oh, how we should delight and take contentment in Him who brings the treasures of grace from the bosom of the Father and opens them to us. And He not only opens the mind of God the Father to us, but comes and lets out the treasure of God's goodness to us. It was stopped before, but Christ opens the floodgates and lets the current of grace and mercy in upon us. Oh, how dear, then, should Christ be to us?

Let Your Soul Delight in God's Abundance

Listen carefully to Me, and eat what is good, and let your soul delight itself in abundance. Incline your ear, and come to Me. Hear, and your soul shall live;

As I watch the news and talk with people each day, I am impressed with our nation's faith in "our government to take care of me, to provide for my needs, to give me the life I deserve." As I listen to our President promise jobs, housing, healthcare, and social security to all, I am impressed with all the people who believe him. I was raised to believe that it was the responsibility of family and church to meet these needs as much as possible. I was raised to believe that each of us had to meet certain responsibilities to attain the quality of life of which we dreamed. Now I hear that these are "rights" given by our government. In reading the Constitution it states that our country was founded on the God-given rights of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. How far we have strayed.

In Isaiah 55:1-3 God shares His promises to us: "Ho! Everyone who thirsts, come to the waters; and you who have no money, come, buy wine and milk without money and without price. Why do you spend money for what is not bread, and your wages for what does not satisfy? Listen carefully to Me, and eat what is good, and let your soul delight itself in abundance. Incline your ear, and come to Me. Hear, and your soul shall live; and I will make an everlasting covenant with you—the sure mercies of David."

"Everyone" includes not only the nation of Israel, but all who seek after what satisfies a person's spirit. "Wine and milk" refer to complete satisfaction. Isaiah 55:6-7 states, "Seek the Lord while He may be

found, call upon Him while He is near.
